The Sisters

Hilda Burke, the matriarch of this community is well known for having had her little country store. The store was originally started by her sister Nellie (McPhee) in 1930. However, a year later Nellie gave birth to her son Stanley and passed on the responsibilities to Hilda. In 1937, Amiable and Guillaume Burke added an addition to the house and Hilda became the storekeeper. The store remained open for a total of fifty-two years until Hilda's retirement in 1983. Hilda was a founding member and the first treasurer of the Catholic Woman's league in 1953 and today still remains an active member. Hilda recalls when the meals were being catered at the first hall which was built in the early fifties that she had to carry kindling from her house to keep the fire from going out. Because there was only one stove and not all vegetables could be cooked at the same time, Hilda cooked the potatoes at her place and then carried them to the hall. As a result of not having a furnace to keep the building

warm in the winter, pop had to be carried on sleds from the store. Hilda also took care of the canteen at the ball field every Sunday during the summer. She was very active in organizing Sunday night cards games and weekly bingo games for many years. She still very much enjoys bingos around the local areas. She resides in her homestead with her sister, Sarah and as long as she refrains from going out on icy steps, we expect to see her around for many more years to come.

Sarah was a schoolteacher in the one-room school in Cannes in 1929 with 60 kids from grades primary to four (so much for teachers complaints today). The following year she taught in French Cove with as many students. However she had grades primary to nine, also in a one-room school. In 1931 she married Dr. Joe Digout and had three children Yvonne, Claire and Danny. Sarah speaks of long days and nights when Joe left to take care of patients (mostly delivering babies including myself). In the summer he used his car but because there was no such thing as a plow in the winter he was taken by a two-horse team driven by neighbor John Alex MacDonald. However, when he had to go to Grand River and Loch Lomond he would go as far as Soldiers Cove and another gentlemen would take him the rest of the way because the horses were exhausted. Many times the patient's family would come and fetch the doctor themselves. It was Sarah's obligation to entertain the patients in the waiting room until her husband returned home. Dr. Digout retired at age seventy-eight and passed away two years later. Sarah now keeps sister Hilda company and they enjoy visitors very much.

Hilda and Sarah's parents were Joe D. Burke and Virginia (Landry) Burke. Joe died in 1936 and Virginia died in 1966. Their sister

Alma passed away from spinal meningitis in 1926 at the age of 6 and Nellie died in 1998.

History

The Thibeaus of River Bourgeois: All of the Thibeaus from River Bourgeois are descended from one man: Jean Jacques (Jacob) Thibeau. Jacob arrived in the area in the 1820's, however, there is little known about where he came from making it difficult to trace his origins. The facts are as follows: An original land grant was made in 1824 to JACOB CHIBAUT for 200 acres ¾ mile north of the head of River Bourgeois. He was listed as a native of Spain, was married with two children and had lived in the province for 10

years. In the 1838 Census JACOB and his wife ANNE TIBO had seven children, one boy and one girl under the age of six, two boys and one girl between the ages of six and fourteen, and one boy and one girl over age fourteen. At the marriage of his daughter ANN to JOHN SHEEN in 1842, he is listed as JEAN THIBEAU and his wife as ANNE MCINLY. At his death in 1856 at the age of 69 (making his birth date approximately 1787) he is named JEAN JACQUES THIBEAULT survived by his wife MARIE MCINLEY. Two additional pieces of information come to us from family folklore. One is that old Thibeau had an accent that others found difficult to understand. The second is that he was somehow connected to the army. One version is that his nickname was RAMÉ (l'armée). Another is that he had a uniform or some other memorabilia in the attic. How accurate these are remains to be seen.

If one begins from the premise that Jacob's last name really was Thibeau then it is likely that he is somehow connected to the other Thibeau Acadian families that had inhabited the lands around the Bay of Fundy prior to the deportation in 1755. By the 1780's some Thibeaus had returned to Nova Scotia and settled in Clare (between Digby and Yarmouth). Others had returned to Québec and settled in Bécancour near Trois-Rivières.

Much revolves around his name. The name JACOB is not French/Acadian however its later variation JEAN JACQUES is. The reference to being a native of Spain is problematic. If this reference is correct then some possibilities include fishing, army/navy deserter, etc. The Basques from northern Spain had had contact with North America

for centuries. Was the last name Thibaut or Chibaut? Or has the name been altered in the same way Giovanni Caboto became John Cabot. The majority of the evidence suggests that his name was JEAN JACQUES THIBEAU and was descended from the Acadians. One possible resolution to the native of Spain is that Florida was a Spanish colony from 1783-1821, which covered his birth period and early life. His connection to the army if it existed still remains a mystery. Some possibilities include English, French, Spanish, American, etc. He lived in interesting time (Napoleonic Wars, War of 1812, etc.) and was the right age to have fought in some of these battles.
